Dear Friends,

Today is the longest day of the year, the ‘summer solstice,’ when, apparently, the sun is directly over the Tropic of Cancer, or 23.5 degrees north latitude. That doesn’t mean much to me, although to both professional and amateur astronomers it does, as well as to ancient and modern people whose religion we sometimes call ‘pagan.’ Today, I am sure there were sunrise ceremonies at Stonehenge and other places throughout the northern hemisphere. (The word *pagan*, by the way, simply means ‘villager, rustic, or civilian, so it probably shouldn’t attract so much disdain. Remember, one of the founding fathers of our town and our parish’s first warden was Robert Pagan.) Although it will take a while for us to notice it, from this day on, the days will get shorter, beginning the process that will lead to the winter solstice in December and the shortest, darkest day of the year.

It always amazes me that the cycle of nature is often mimicked or accompanied by the Christian Church's calendar, reminding me that nature is not really opposed to revelation. In a few days, we will celebrate the Feast of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist. From the day of his birth until the moment he revealed Jesus as the Saviour, ("Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sin of the world." John 1:29), John's star was in the ascendancy. His mission as the last of the Old Testament prophets accomplished, he decreased in importance, his nadir was reached when Herod ordered his execution.

John's example reminds us that no matter how brightly our star shines, in our own eyes or in the eyes of others, our mission is the same as John's, to point the way to Jesus, to proclaim him the Saviour of the world. We all must decrease that he might increase. He is the Light of the World, born in the darkness of winter, to illumine our hearts and minds with the truth of his love.

Enclosed you will find a newsletter reminding you of the many activities our parish will be involved in this summer, as well as the first in a series of stewardship letters you will receive over the next months. Please read them carefully and if you have any questions, do not hesitate to contact me. If Jesus is to 'increase' as a presence in our church, our community and in our personal lives, we must give more of ourselves, our time, talent and treasure to him. John the Baptist, whom we will soon celebrate, gave his all. How fitting it is that not only our lovely Chapel of Ease in Chamcook, but the whole of our nation claims him as patron. May his life and death inspire us as we proclaim Jesus as our Lord and God.

ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST CHAPEL OPEN FOR THE SUMMER AND LOOKING GREAT

The Chapel in Chamcook is open for the summer season, a bit later than usual due to extensive repairs and renovations to this historic building. The plaster walls and ceiling, that had not been touched in twenty years, were repaired and painted, the carpet, over forty years old, was removed, the floors sanded, stained and sealed. Glebe Road builders (brothers Keith and Steve Raaflaub) did a great job of redoing the walls and ceiling and Peter Arsenault did an equally wonderful job of the floor. Ricard Orr is responsible for the magnificent job done to restore the lettering over the chancel arch. Many thanks to Jack Bertke, Chapel Warden, for overseeing this work, to Cathy Smith for spearheading the refinishing of the floors and to the many volunteers who removed carpet and moved and returned pews. Dave Lord and the Property Committee, with others they recruited, deserve an extra 'tip of the hat' for taking out the carpet, a very difficult task. Cathy Smith and Helen Stephenson, with the professional help of Gwen Eldridge, did a wonderful job of cleaning after the work was finished. Thank you, as well, to the Atlantic Salmon Federation for allowing the use of the brood stock building to store pews and other things from the Chapel. Once the red carpet runner is installed this project will be complete. Thank you all for a job well done!

SUMMER SERVICE SCHEDULE

STEWARDSHIP LETTER NO. 1: JUNE, 2018

SUBJECT: E-OFFERING

Dear Members & Friends of the Anglican Parish of St. Andrews,

This is the first in a series of 'stewardship letters' you will be receiving. We hope they will accomplish a number of things. First, they will bring you up to date on our parish's financial situation (see the reverse of this page). Second, they will be a way to thank you for your continued support of our shared ministry. Third, the letters will encourage you to consider the many ways you can give of yourself, your 'time, treasure and talent,' so that the ministry we share can be more effective and fulfilling.

Inevitably, the tendency of stewardship letters is to focus on finances, perhaps because such letters are often sent out in times of financial crisis or uncertainty. Fortunately, this is not the case as you receive this letter, your generosity and the generosity of those who contribute to our endowment have given us a financial stability for which we should be most thankful. However, if our parish's ministry is to be *sustained* and *expanded*, the ways each of us contribute to God's call to be his fellow workers (see 1 Corinthians 3:9) should be examined regularly.

Stewardship, which can be defined as the proper use of *all* the gifts God has given us, involves more than money, as the "three T's" mentioned above remind us. In our parish we are so blessed to have a group of faithful volunteers who do so many things that benefit our church family and the community as a whole. Whatever we do, whatever we give, we must keep in mind the "Great Commission" given to the Church by Jesus before his return to heaven: "Go and make disciples of all the nations." (St. Matthew 28:19) The making of disciples, followers of Jesus, is what we are all about.

With that in mind, the issue this letter will focus on is the *regularity* of our financial giving, and a way that this can be ensured, 'E-Offering.' In today's busy world, church attendance for many individuals is not an 'every Sunday event'. Work and family commitments, lifestyle choices and the general change in society's attitude to 'the day of rest' have affected all the churches. Yet, just as in our personal households, bills have to be paid regularly—electricity, taxes, rent, water, etc.—so in the 'household of God' there are regular expenses to be paid. At home and in the church, there are also extraordinary expenses—repairs to buildings, replacement of appliances and equipment, etc. The regularity of giving for the support of the church's work is important and can be accomplished in a number of ways but a convenient way to do this is to sign up for E-Offering, a program administered by the Diocese of Fredericton. Participation in the program allows the withdrawal of equal amounts from a designated bank account, on a schedule you choose and can be adjusted seasonally, for the benefit of our parish.

An E-Offering information sheet/application form is enclosed. Would you please take time to look it over and if you are not already using this method of regular contribution to the ministry of our parish, consider signing up. Our parish treasurer, Peter Mitchell, would be happy to answer any questions you may have. Thank you and God bless you.

e-offering with automatic withdrawal

e-offering is an automated process which provides another way for you to make contributions to your Parish.

You can use *e-offering* to automatically withdraw money from your chequing account for your Parish. It is as easy as any other automatic withdrawal service you use in your financial affairs. It helps you to make regular contributions.

Here are some answers to your questions about *e-offering*.

What benefit does *e-offering* have for my Parish?

- Offerings are more consistent and regular, regardless of snowstorms, attendance etc.
- Parish cash flow improves so that expenses can be dealt with on a more timely basis.

When would my offering be made from my account?

- It is up to you, it can be once per week or once per month.

Do I lose control over the amount I'm giving to my Church?

- You can change the amount of the withdrawal at any time.
- You can give additional gifts to your parish any time.

Does this mean I no longer have envelopes?

- You will still have envelopes which you can use as a symbol of your gift. Just write -- "*e-offering*."
- You can also use your envelopes to make offerings in response to special appeals and festivals.

Are there any other parishes using *e-offering*?

- The program was initially piloted in two parishes and others have joined since. The program is now being offered to all parishes in the Diocese.

Who looks after *e-offering*?

- The Diocese has made the required banking arrangements and has appointed an administrator. Your Parish will appoint a local Coordinator.

1. Complete the application form on the opposite side of this brochure.
Remember to sign it.

2. Attach a "voided" cheque, unsigned.

3. Bring it to the Parish Office or put it on the Sunday offering plate.

You will be informed when the *e-offering* automatic withdrawal program is to begin in your Parish. The withdrawals will begin after your parish coordinator submits your application.

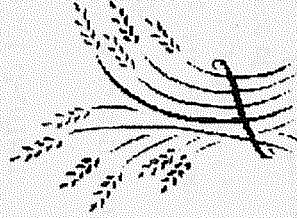
